I am a Senior Counselor at the Elmira Correctional Facility and supervise the I.C.P. (Intermediate Care Program). I have become familiar with inmate Roy Brown since his arrival here at Elmira in December, 2000. Since Mr. Brown's arrival, he has asked me to proof read various papers to ensure proper spelling and to ensure he has not lost control of his emotions and typed something that is inappropriate. I have also permitted Mr. Brown to use the ICP copy machine on occasion.

Mr. Brown brought a copy of a letter dated 12/24/03 addressed to a Barry Bench (see attachment). He has asked me if I recall reviewing this letter. Under normal circumstances recalling this letter would not be so simplified. I do, however, recall this letter due to its inappropriate contents and the day being Christmas Eve and the fact I had an early out (leaving work at 1:15 p.m. that day).

He has asked me to write a letter to verify that he had mailed this letter on 12/24/03. As I explained to him, I was not physically present to observe him depositing this letter into the mailbox. I did, however, observe Mr. Brown on 12/24/03, and his intentions of mailing this letter seemed quite sincere. I am confident of Mr. Brown's intentions, and it is my belief that he did mail this letter as stated above.

Mr. Brown is a good worker and helps many of the other inmates as in I.P.A. (Inmate Program Assistant).

Miscellaneous Arrests

Sodus Police reported the arrest on Saturday (12/27) of Calloway L. Perry, age 35, of 306 West Union Street in Newark for two warrants for Failure to Pay Fines on a Harassment and DWI conviction.

The fines dated back to 1999.

Newark Police reported the arrest on Tuesday of Luis J. Roldan, age 17, of ridge Road in Sodus for one count of petit Larceny for an alleged theft of merchandise from the WalMart store.

Newark Police Officer, Matt Nielsen, reported the arrest on Thursday night of Steven DeBoerdere, age 48, giving no permanent address for Criminal Trespass and Resisting Arrest.

DeBoerdere refused to leave the Dunkin Donuts on East Union Street and became physical with the police. He was arraigned and remanded to jail on \$500 cash/\$1000 bond.

Palmyra Police Officer, Brian Sextone, reported the arrest on Wednesday of Matt Scarborough, age 22, of 941 Gaywood Lane in Webster following a traffic stop on Jackson Street.

Scarborough was subsequently arrested for Aggravated Unlicensed Operation in the 2nd Degree and a record check showed he had two prior arrests for A/O 2nd. He was also charged with no Seat Belt, Unlicensed Driver, Unregistered, Uninsured vehicle, and Switched License Plates.

Scarborough was arraigned and jailed on \$500 cash bail.

Sodus Police reported the arrest on Saturday (12/20) of Donald M. Shaw, age 43, of 33 Union Street in Sodus for Assault in the 2nd Degree and Criminal Mischief.

It is alleged that Shaw punched the walls at the home of Angela L. Debuyser, hit and pulled her hair during an argument.

Shaw was arraigned and remanded to jail on \$1000 cash bail.

Sodus Police reported the arrest on Friday (12/19) of Amber Gosnell, age 17, of 61-44 Buyd Road in Sodus on a warrant for Harassment in the 2nd Degree involving a fight on Main Street in the Village

Palmyra Police reported the arrest on Tuesday of Valdivia M. Garza, age 30, of Vienna Street in Palmyra following a traffic stop.

Garza was charged with Uninspected, Unregistered Vehicle, Operating Without Insurance, Unlicensed Operation and Improper License Plates. She was arraigned and remanded to jail on \$1000 cash/\$2000 bond. Police also discovered Garza was wanted on a Oregon warrant.

Newark Police reported the arrest on Thursday of Adam Offen, age 22, of 2880 Sandhill Road, Lot #7 in Newark for Issuing a Bad Check in the amount of \$50. He will appear in Newark Court on Jan. 17th.

In what is being labeled as a suicide, a man was struck by a westbound Amtrak passenger train travelling at 79 miles per hour on Monday.

Barry Bench, age 41, of Broadway Road in Cato died instantly. Police said the train's engineer reported he saw what appeared to be a person laying on the tracks and applied his emergency brakes, but, as the train approached, the person stood up, outstretched his arms and was struck.

None of the trains passengers or workers were injured

Local schools raise more than \$30,000 for United Way

Clyde Savannah, Marion, Sodus, and Wayne Central all exceed fundraising goals

The results are in for the annual United Way of Wayne County Fall Campaign, and local school districts did their part by raising \$30,700 for the annual fall appeal. The dollars raised in the fall campaign represent the first dollars toward the United Way of Wayne County/Red Cross Spring Campaign which begins in March.

A total of eleven schools districts participated in the campaign. Among those that exceeded their fundraising goals were: Clyde Savannah, Marion, Sodus, and Wayne Central. These districts raised a combined total of more than \$17,000. Wayne Central raised more than any other district, bringing in \$6,000, and Marion had the strongest participation rate at 38 percent.

Special recognition goes to the following campaign coordinators: William Schmidt, Clyde Savannah; Carol Brown, Marion; Tiffany Phillips, Jeff Lisanto, David R. Stahlecker, Susan Barns, Al Autovino, Robert Galloway, and Kathy Bliok of Sodus; and Mark Callahan, Wayne Central.

Along with local schools, the success of the Fall Campaign is due in large part to the outstanding efforts of companies like ExxonMobil Chemical who also ran a United Way campaign this fall. ExxonMobil employees helped raise more than \$83,000 for United Way this year.

In total, the Fall Campaign for United Way of Wayne County raised \$118,919, exceeding its goal by more than \$14,000. Although the Fall Campaign surpassed its goal, United Way volunteers are anticipating a difficult year for fundraising with the slow economic recovery cited as a major factor.

8 YEAR CAR LOAN?

As you know, car leases in New York State are pretty much history now. But you did have low monthly payments.

I can't tell you how many people have complained to me after accidents that they were not getting enough money to pay off their loans. They thought the insurance company (you and I) should be responsible for their lousy deals.

The bottom line? Buy a car you can afford with monthly payments not longer than 4 years and don't be "upside down" or you will be S.O.L.
